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Naoki Ikegami is Professor at the School of Public Health, St Luke's International University, and Professor Emeritus at Keio University, Tokyo. He was Chair of the Department of Health Policy and Management at the Keio School of Medicine, from which he received his MD and PhD. He also received a Master of Arts degree in health services studies with Distinction from Leeds University (United Kingdom). During 1990-1991, he was a visiting professor at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School and Medical School. He is a founding member of *interRAI* (a non-profit international consortium of researchers and clinicians focused on care planning instruments), and served as a consultant to the WHO and the World Bank. He has been President of the Japan Society of Healthcare Administration and of the Japan Health Economics Association. He has sat on various national and state government committees, including the Chair of the Investigative Specialist Sub-committee on Case-mix Based Reimbursement for Chronic Inpatient Care and member of the Reforming Elder Healthcare Council and of the End-of-Life Health Care Council. His research areas are health policy, long-term care and pharmacoeconomics. His publications include "The Art of Balance in Health Policy - Maintaining Japan's Low-Cost Egalitarian System" (Cambridge University Press, 1998) with John C. Campbell, "Japanese universal health coverage: evolution, achievement, and challenges" (lead author) (*Lancet*, 2011), "Universal Coverage for Inclusive and Sustainable Development: Lessons from Japan" (editor) (World Bank, 2014). He has contributed a chapter in "Regulating Long-Term Care Quality" (edited by Vince Mor et al, Cambridge University Press, 2014) and in "Long-term care reforms in OECD Countries (edited by Chistiano Gori et al, Policy Press, 2016).

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
